VISION of the Mind of Christ Institute

Providing A Positive Teaching Environment That Is Conducive To Learning

Mind of Christ Institute (MOCI), a Christian educational institution, is covered as a ministry/business under the Church of the Everlasting Kingdom (C.O.T.E.K). The school serves students throughout the United States of America through its home location in Baltimore, Maryland and by way of distance learning.

Mind of Christ Institute is committed to serving people of diverse backgrounds.

MOCI does not discriminate by gender, religion, denomination, faith, physical disability, race, or age. MOCI is open to anyone desiring to seek information on Christianity, the Kingdom of God, and Biblical principles.

Sharing The Truth Across A Multitude Of Demography And Geography

Mind of Christ Institute supports both traditional and nontraditional students. Regardless of one's commitments in life, MOCI offers courses that can be balanced with other responsibilities.

Courses are held both at the Mind of Christ Institute headquarters and at requested locations throughout the United States of America. Classes are often facilitated at churches, schools, and community centers.

Mind of Christ Institute is committed to quality Christian education. MOCI is designed for all levels and aspects of ministry (disciples, leaders, disciples, ministers, deacons, elders, apostles, prophets, evangelists, pastors, teachers, and bishops); however, courses are also available for individuals with a thirst for a deeper understanding of scripture.

Founding History of the Mind of Christ Institute

"Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus (Philippians 2:5)."

The Mind of Christ Institute was founded in the Greater Baltimore area in 2000 by educators and spiritual leaders, Dr. Doral R. Pulley and Pastor Latonia Moss. The school was birthed out of their calls to serve God, minister to those in need of spiritual direction, and remain true to their passions for learning. Pastor Latonia attributed the school's name to Philippians 2:5; "Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus."

"We are renewed through the mind and transformed through the mind. A changed mind allows us to change our behavior. A transformed mind is not immediate, but progressive. A transformed mind happens over a lifetime." At its inception, the Mind of Christ Institute was an extension of Kingdom Empowerment Center and Training Institute (KECTI) and served as the ministry's academic arm. Nearly 30 aspiring ministers and leaders of KECTI served as the school's first students. Then elders, Doral and Latonia, championed the academic agenda in accordance with their areas of expertise.

Pastor Latonia focused on studies in spiritual and character development, while Dr. Pulley instructed students in leadership development and biblical knowledge. Like many institutions of higher

education and advanced learning, MOCI began conducting its classes in the buildings of churches and the basements of homes. The first headquarters was in Dr. Pulley's Woodcrest Avenue home in Baltimore County. The school later held classes in a host of satellite locations to include Saint Frances' Community Center (Chase Street), Kingdom Life Empowerment Ministries (Liberty Road in Randallstown, MD) and 1201 W. Baltimore Street.

The business of ministry within the school has historically been supported by a host of faithful administrators. In the early years, Rebecca Truesdale managed the offices and served as registrar—maintaining the course catalog, academic calendars, and transcripts. Her efforts were continued by Candace Willis from 2006 to 2012. She began as the administrative assistant to the school's dean, A. Bernard Hector, and was progressively promoted to serve as the school's registrar and later its director.

During the span of over 20 years, the Mind of Christ School of Ministry has matriculated more than 100 students, awarding the great majority of them certificates of ministry and/or licensure. Consistent with the school's covenant relationship with the universal Christian church, its certificates have accompanied the ordination and consecration credentials of leaders, ministers, deacons, elders, overseers, and bishops throughout the United States. Much of the infrastructure behind the system that governs the school and church cooperative was documented by Gina A. Dorsey, who served both the school and its covering, the Church of the Everlasting Kingdom for nearly two decades.

In 2010 the consciousness of the school's curriculum was expanded. Like the impetus scripture of Philippians 2:5, Proverbs 9:1 strongly resonated with the school's visionary leadership. "Wisdom hath builded her house, she hath hewn out her seven pillars." It was not enough for graduates of the school to be knowledgeable. The work and business of ministry needed students of truth and wisdom. Dr. Pulley, Bishop Hector, and the governing body of MOCI worked to adopt seven pillars of which to engage and enforce learning:

- 1. Homiletics/Public Speaking
- 2. Bible Knowledge
- 3. Character Development
- 4. Fivefold Ministry
- 5. Practical Ministry/Sacraments
- 6. Metaphysics (Truth Teaching and New Thought Doctrine)
- 7. Hermeneutics

By these pillars, the school would endeavor to ensure wise, sound, balanced clergy.

Distance Learning

2010 also marked a technological milestone for MOCI when it launched its first virtual campus leveraging the Educadium online learning platform. Through Educadium, the school maintained its full minister track curriculum, inclusive of registration, course catalogs, instruction (streaming lectures, video conferencing, videos, case studies, interactive chats and discussion groups, quizzes and final examinations), grades and transcripts. Educadium hosted virtual campuses for MOCI in Baltimore and Atlanta. These innovative initiatives were led by Julius Ford, who also served for a time as the school's director, dean, and provost.

Expanding its reach to the DC, New York and Florida, distance learning has morphed into far more than an online presence and digital footprint. The school now hosts classes, seminars and workshops and conferences on a variety of social mediums (Facebook Live, YouTube, Zoom, Stream Yard). Content for many classes and from some instructors may be found within the pages and posts of Instagram and Twitter.

These expansions and technological advancements would not have been possible without the continued evolutionary leadership of the Vice President, former school's dean, Bishop A. Bernard Hector and his diverse faculty and staff. The past two years of online production (especially the last 12 months of thriving through a global pandemic, COVID-19) have been led by Patrick Arthur in Florida. Matching his professionalism and passionate commitment are Renet Dennard Cole (also in Florida) and Linda Johnson in New York. These two ladies have worked as registrars.

In September 2020 Dr. Vince L. Monden was appointed Dean of Mind of Christ School of Ministry by Dr. Doral R. Pulley founder and president. In February 2021 Mind of Christ School of Ministry, changed its name to Mind of Christ Institute. In May 2021 Mind of Christ Institute was granted accreditation, with The Accrediting Commission International Beebe Arkansas.

After 20 years of service, he retired from being the Assistant Principal of St. Frances Academy, an inner city Catholic high school. Dr. Pulley is the Presiding Prelate, President, and CEO of the Church of the Everlasting Kingdom, a network of leaders, assemblies, ministries, and businesses throughout the United States and abroad who manifest the Kingdom of God right here on earth.

In 2014, he graduated from the Johnnie Coleman Theological Seminary 's Previously Ordained Clergy Program and received credentials from the Universal Foundation for Better Living. In April 2017, he expanded his full-time ministry in Florida and became the founding Spiritual Leader of Today's Church in Tampa. He opened another location in St. Petersburg, Florida in April 2019. Today's Church Tampa Bay continues to experience spiritual, numerical, financial, and physical growth amidst the various challenges of our society.

POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

Notice Of Non-Discrimination

MOCI does not discriminate and admits students of any race, sex, orientation, color, national or ethnic origin to all the privileges, programs and activities generally accorded or made available to MOCI students.

Admission

Admission to MOCI is based upon the character, ability, and motivation to satisfactorily complete the academic requirements. Admission also depends on the Christian experience, call to ministry, and moral character of the individual.

Students must maintain personal integrity, respect, and tolerance for those from other Christian faith groups, a desire for spiritual growth, and a readiness to accept correction.

All applicants must have a high school diploma, GED, or the equivalent. Overseas applicants must have graduated from secondary (leaving) school or have successfully completed the GCE examination.

Enrollment Procedure

Specific information and enrollment materials can be obtained on campus or are mailed upon request to prospective students. All official enrollments require the following:

- 1. A completed Student Information and Evaluation Form.
- 2. A completed Tuition Payment Plan/Enrollment Form.
- 3. Validation of high school diploma, GED, or equivalent.
- 4. Official transcripts of all college studies (mailed to MOCI directly from the college).
- 5. A recent photograph.
- 6. The enrollment fees.

Upon receipt of these items, a student file will be processed and complete instructions for beginning studies will be sent. All applications are subject to the approval of the Admissions Office.

Registration

Students may register for classes online at www.cotekincrease.org/five-fold-affairs.

Attendance

Attendance represents 10% of all course grades. Students are expected to attend all regularly scheduled classes. If an absence is necessary, students are expected to contact their instructor beforehand. During an absence, students are expected to make up all material issued by their instructor, including exams. Any student absent for three consecutive classes, or five classes throughout the twelve-class trimester, excluding holidays, emergencies, or class cancellations, will be withdrawn automatically from that course.

Independent Study

Students who demonstrate advanced proficiency, have an undergraduate degree, or have maintained a "B" average in at least 3 courses at MOCI may request in writing two weeks prior to registration to take a course as an independent study. MOCI administration will decide by the registration deadline if the student may take the course as an independent study.

Prerequisites & Practicum

Prerequisite -Where it is annotated; students cannot be enrolled in courses without the appropriate prerequisite or approval of a MOCI official.

Practicum - Students in these courses must provide proof of a practical application experience during study. A ministry activity report must be submitted to MOCI after completion of the Practicum by the Ministry supervisor.

"I" = Incomplete Grade

Instructors may choose to give an "I" to a student(s) who has not completed required course assignments rather than a "D." Students must complete their assignment(s) within the first six (6) weeks of the following semester or the "I" will become an "F."

Enrollment Process

Students applying must submit the following information to Admissions:

- Completed Application Form (new students and re-admission only)
- Admission Fee (new students and re-admission only)
- Class Registration Form
- Course Fee
- Transcripts (if applicable)

OTHER WAYS TO EARN COURSE CREDIT

Transfer Credit

Mind of Christ Institute offers credit for some classes that may have been taken at an accredited divinity program.

In a traditional school most credit hours are generally earned by taking and completing classes. Non-traditional educational units may be earned in other ways. The most common methods are these.

Life Experience Credit

Life Experience Learning Credit is given for what you have learned, regardless of how or where it was learned. For example, a given university might offer six courses in German worth 4 semester units each. If you can show them that you speak and write German just as well as someone who has taken and passed those six courses, then they will give you 24 semester units of German, whether you learned the language from your grandmother, from living in Germany, or from Berlitz tapes. The same philosophy is applied to business experience, ministry experience, learning to fly an airplane, military training and dozens of other non-classrooms learning experiences.

Equivalency Examinations

Many institutions of learning say that if you can pass an examination in a subject, then you should get credit for knowing that subject, without having to sit in a classroom month after month to "learn" what you already know.

More than 100 standard equivalency exams are offered, worth anywhere from 2 to 39 semester units each. In general, each hour of examination is worth anywhere from 2 to 6 semester units each. But different schools may award significantly different amounts of credit for the same examinations. Some schools will design examinations in fields in which there are no standard exams.

Online Courses - there are many colleges and universities offering thousands of home study courses, most of which may be taken by people living anywhere in the world. They can take on the forms, including educational videos, audio files, images, worksheets, or other documents. Most online courses also have discussion forms, community groups or messaging options, enabling some way for students to communicate with each other and or the teacher. These courses are generally worth anywhere from 2 to 6 semester units each and require anywhere from a month to two to a year or more to complete.

Learning Contracts- Quite a few schools will negotiate a learning contract with a student. A learning contract is a formal, negotiated agreement between the student and the school, stating that if the student does certain things (for instance, read these books, writes a paper of this length, does the following laboratory experiments, etc.) then, upon their successful completion, the school will award so many units of credit. Learning contracts can be written for anywhere form a few units up to and including an entire program. Often the school will provide a faculty member to guide the course of study.

MOCI Honor Code

Professionals with the highest of responsibilities as students of the ministry, are required by society and God to show a level of integrity that is beyond reproach.

There are two reasons an Honor Code is needed:

- 1. There should be a sense of satisfaction that you have done what is biblically correct.
- 2. There should be a recognition that people around you see and know that you are Christian in all you say and do.

Re-admission

If a student has completed a course in the past but has not taken a course under Mind of Christ Institute in four semesters, they are required to complete a new application and pay the applicable fees.

Re-admission after suspension or academic probation is never automatic. The student must apply for re-admission through the Admissions Office, subject to the approval of the Administration. If re-admission is granted, the student must re-enroll in the program, subject to the rates and requirements in effect at the time of re-enrollment.

Variations such as intensives may occur at the discretion of MOCI administration and will require

payment of the intensive fee.

All course fees are non-refundable.

Fees are applicable to Non-Church of the Everlasting Kingdom Members.

PAYMENTS All payments to Mind of Christ Institute must be made prior to the end of the course. Students who have not paid four (4) weeks after the beginning of class will be withdrawn by the instructor.

DESCRIPTIONS OF CURRICULUM TRACKS

Biblical Literacy (Biblical Track)

This track is for persons who desire the ability to rightly read and understand the Bible, using the proper tools of. study, thereby becoming well acquainted with the Bible's character (innate qualities) and content. This definition implies a personal interaction with the Bible. It pictures a person who opens their bible and quietly reads a passage of scripture to themselves. They study the passage using the tools they have learned. They then can rightly understand the meaning of the text.

Kingdom Citizenship (Discipleship Track)

Kingdom is the system, form of government a way being, seeing, thinking, speaking, and behaving in which God is the center. This track is for new believers and those who have decided to take a more disciplined approach to their spirituality. It explores the basic spiritual disciplines and helps one establish a firm identity of who God is, who they are, and how they relate to others.

Kingdom Leadership (Leadership Track) Before a person can be an effective leader, he/she must be a good servant. students on this track will learn how to lead their own lives effectively and lead others by example and through servitude. Specific attention will be spent on character development, time management, money management, and emotional management. Basic leadership skills in the areas of written and oral communication will also be taught. Students will learn how to serve as a ministry leader (conduct meetings, plan events, and work with various personality types and learning styles).

General Theology (Minister Track)

This track is for people who feel called to be trained as an official minister. Being a minister is the baseline of service in the local church. We are all called to be ministers because we are all called to serve. God has given all of us the ministry of reconciliation (II Corinthians 5:15-20). He also commanded that we all go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature and to manifest our ministry through laying hands on the sick and casting out devils (Mark 16:15-20). Therefore, it is God's desire that every believer would accept his/her call to ministry thus living a lifestyle that is consistent with such a call and receiving the necessary training to be an effective servant.

Practical Theology (Deacon Track)

This track is for people who desire to be ordained to the office of deacon in the local church. The office of the deacon is the second highest office in the church. It is an ordained position that is appointed by human beings (elders) and approved by God. The position of the deacon was birthed out of a need in the early church (Acts 6). Deacons are servants. They are called to serve the Lord, the spiritual leaders, the elders, and the congregation.

Transformational Theology (Elder Track)

This track is for people who feel called to be trained as an official elder. The office of the elder is the highest ordination in the Body of Christ. The elder is appointed by God and approved by human beings. It is a lifetime position that cannot be revoked. Elders are mature believers who have met the spiritual, personal, and domestic qualifications of the scriptures (I Timothy 3). The hour of singular ministry is over. The plurality of elders in the local church is a biblical concept that was established in the early church and is applicable to the 21st century church. Elders are people who have been called to five-fold ministry. All these ministry gifts are needed for the Body of Christ to reach unity of the faith, full maturity, and to effectively do the work of ministry. There are also elders of administration who are

appointed to handle various matters. Elders are to be respected for their wisdom and knowledge and honored for their labor in ministry.

Pastoral Theology (Spiritual Leaders Track)

Jesus Christ was an apostle, prophet, evangelist, pastor, and teacher. When he left, he gave these gifts to people (Ephesians 4:11-13). We do not have to look for another paradigm by which to structure our churches. The Pastoral Ministry guards the congregation and ensures that the needs of the sheep are being met through various services and programs. Pastoral theology thus aims at seeking out the best way possible to render service to those who need God, whether it is in teaching, preaching, administration, worship, singing, praying, counseling, sacramental life, or spiritual life. This track is for people who believe they have been called to the Pastoral Ministry.

Episcopal Studies (Overseer Track)

An Overseer is a mature elder with years of training and experience who assists a bishop by completing various assigned task or in some instances an assignment to a territory. This track is for people of whom has usually served as an Elder and has been designated by the Presiding Prelate of an organization or reformation. Some organizations and reformations use the position of an overseer as a training ground for the office of the bishop. This track is designed to educate the individual on the role and responsibility of an overseer.

Episcopal Theology (Bishop Track)

Since the time of the New Testament and throughout the history of the Christian Church, there has been the order of bishops who carry on the administrative work of overseeing, leading supervising, and uniting the Church worldwide. This track will educate the students of the types of prelates recognized by the Church of the Everlasting Kingdom, the vestments and ornaments worn by bishops and their meaning, as well as the role and responsibility of a bishop.

ELECTIVES

E001 - Teacher Preparation 2-hour sessions for 3 weeks

This course is designed to prepare instructors of MOC to adequately prepare to instruct MOC courses.

E002 - Credential Essentials 2-hour session This course is designed to provide the student practical application to formalize the process to confer licensure and ordination. The student will be able to determine the criteria for credentials, policies, and procedures for those who are and are not under the C.O.T.E.K. covering.

E003 - Principles of Financial Freedom 2-hour sessions for 8 weeks

This is an extensive eight (8) week course, which uses money as a tool to deeper faith in God as our source. Each class session features an inner process designed to produce deep healing of core issues.

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

101 - Books of Law

An exegetical study of the books of Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy.

102 - Books of History

This course discusses the historical books of Judges, Ruth, I and II Samuel, and I and II Kings. books of Joshua, I and II Chronicles, Ezra, Nehemiah, and Esther.

103 - Books of Poetry

This is an exegetical study of the Old Testament poetical books of Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and the Song of Solomon.

104 – Books of Prophecy: Major Prophets This is an exegetical study of the prophetical books of Isaiah, Jeremiah, Lamentations, Ezekiel, and Daniel. and exegetical study of the minor prophetical books of Hosea, Joel, Amos, Obadiah, Jonah, and Micah, Nahum, Habakkuk, Zephaniah, Haggai, Zechariah, and Malachi.

105 – The Gospels

The stories of Jesus, the preaching of the first witnesses to God come in the flesh to dwell among us. If we want to understand the Christian faith, we need to understand and meet Jesus. In this class we will learn the literary features of each Gospel writer (3) how each Gospel writer told the story of Jesus a bit differently.

106 - The Book of Acts

This is a study of early church history including an overview of the journeys of Paul.

107 - The Pauline Epistles An exegetical study of Romans, I and II Corinthians, Galatians, Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, I and II Thessalonians, I and II Timothy, Titus, Hebrews, and Philemon

108 - The General Epistles

A study of the books of James; I and II Peter; I, II, and III John; and Jude.

109 – The Book of Revelation Prophecy

An exegetical study of this apocalyptic book.

110 - Kingdomology I

Introduction - Define Kingdom, Descriptions of Kingdom, Stages of Kingdom)

111 - Daily Abundance (Description)

God is abundance, there is no abundance outside of God. This course teaches the difference between being abundant and having abundance, and the ways abundance manifests in your life, world, and affairs.

112 – 7 Stages of Creation

This course will focus on the process by which all creative activity occurs from Divine Mind, beginning in consciousness and then into physical manifestation. The student will discover we are essential to the forming of our mental, emotional, and physical realities by using the Law of Cause and Effect. This Law is particularized in the Law of Mind Action and Divine Order to actively create in this world through the power of our thoughts and words.

113 – Holistic Growth and Development I This course is designed to help the student discover their gifts and talents through gift assessments and establishing an individualized plan of holistic growth and development.

114 – Knowing Jesus in the 5th Dimension This course centers on Knowing what it means to know Jesus as, Savior, Christ, Lord, King, and God.

201 - The Fruit of the Spirit

This course is designed to increase awareness of God's attributes in our lives in order that they may be manifested. This course focuses on the nine (9) Fruit of the Spirit as evidence of that manifestation.

202 - Twelve Spiritual Disciplines

We are spiritual beings living in a spiritual universe. (One word) that is governed by one spiritual law, the law of love. This course will instruct the students on how to demonstrate our love through 12 spiritual practices. Which are: reading, studying, and researching the scriptures, denials and affirmations, Thanksgiving, praise, and worship, fasting and forgiving, stillness and movement, silence, and sound, giving and stewardship of your time, talents, and treasure. Fellowship with the Saints and positive people, visioning and visualization, meditation, mindfulness, and breathing writing and journaling, witnessing, and sharing your testimony with others .12 is the number of permanent perfections. 12 is 4 multiplied by 3, and therefore it is the created being united with the Creator.

203 - Holistic Growth & Development II The course will provide the learner with 8 self-care strategies.

204 - Kingdomology II

Kingdom Perfection and Kingdom Process (Keys to the Kingdom)

205 - It's Just That Simple!

This foundational course is based on the biblical Commandment to Love. Matthew 22:37-40 Love God. Love Yourself and Everybody Else.

206 - The Works of the Flesh

The course provides the student with the understanding of the meaning the word "flesh" (not the material body, but to the body as used by the soul. Galatians 5:17 Paul the Apostle describes the two forces at work within us. – The Holy Spirit and our evil inclinations. (Flesh lusts against the Spirit) Evil is not an enemy we have to constantly fear and fight; it is to be overcome by healing our sense of separation and withdrawing the power we give it.

207 – Understanding the Godhead

The traditional Trinity (God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit) has been meaningful to Christians in one way or another for centuries. To many individuals it signifies a great mystery. In this course the

student will learn that The Trinity of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit represent the three primary creative aspects of Beingness that we interpret metaphysically as Mind, Idea and Expression.

208 – Introduction to the Bible

The course will provide the student with the knowledge of how the bible came to be gathered into the great religious libraries we know as the Old Testament and New Testament, and the Apocrypha.

301 - Personal Stewardship

This course is designed to learn how to lead their lives effectively and to lead others by example. Specific attention will be spent on character development, time management, money management, emotional management, and Fruits of the Spirit and works of the flesh an understanding of sin and how it separates them from God. Some topics that will be included in the course will be sexual sin, immorality, and holiness.

302 - The Heart of the Servant

(Prerequisite: Personal Stewardship)

This course is designed to introduce students to the ministry of serving through life example and statements of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. The student will learn basic principles of servitude and be able to apply them in practical settings.

303 - Introduction to Leadership

This course is designed to prepare students to become track leaders (conduct meetings, plan events and to work with various personality types and learning styles. Practicum required.

304 - Oral Communication

This course is designed to help students communicate effectively orally and in writing in the world, church, and kingdom. Some topics that will be discussed are types of communication, the communication process, and understanding various forms of oral resuscitation.

305 - Written Communication

In this course the student will learn how to express yourself clearly, using language with precision; constructing a logical argument; note taking, editing, and summarizing; and writing reports.

306 - The Ministry of Armor Bearer

(Prerequisites: Personal Stewardship and The Heart of a Servant)

This course is designed to teach students how to serve men and women of God who are in ministry in the spirit of excellence. Students will learn how to serve from a historical, theoretical, and practical perspective.

307 - Church Administration I

(Prerequisite: Personal Stewardship)

This course is designed to teach students how to become an effective administrator in the local church. The following topics will be covered: telephone etiquette, church calendar, weekly bulletins, church rosters, and sacramental certificates.

308 - Kingdomology III

This course is designed to help the student understand what it means to be a Kingdom Citizen through teachings about the Kingdom and Kingdom Principles, Practices, and Promises.

309 - The Ministry of the Acolyte

The word acolyte comes from the Greek word akolouthos meaning follower, helper, or assistant. Acolytes may have any number of helping functions. This course is designed to understand the role and duties of an Acolyte in the life of the church.

310 - Church Technology

In a day when communication travels faster than ever and is immediately available, we have an opportunity as followers of Christ to take advantage of new tools for sharing the Gospel. This course is designed to teach the student the dynamics and mechanics of how to share church services and events through live streaming using several platforms. Zoom, YouTube and Facebook are some of the platforms used, and other platforms created specifically for churches.

311 - Holistic Growth and Development III

The course will provide the learner with 9 neighbor networking principles.

401 - Introduction to Ministry

This course is designed to provide the student with an introductory understanding of ministry and to begin equipping the student with tools effective in the ministry of Jesus Christ. Some topics will include ministry hierarchy, effective Biblical ministers, ministry responsibility.

402 - Old Testament Survey

This course is designed to provide the student with an understanding of the Old Testament. This course gives a history of the Jewish nation. Some topics will include creation, Old Testament prophets, and Old Testament poetry.

403 - New Testament Survey

This course is designed to provide the student with an understanding of the New Testament. This course introduces the history of the church. Some topics will include the ministry of Jesus Christ and the epistles.

404 - Homiletics I

(Prerequisite: O/T and N/T Survey or permission of MOC Official)

This course is designed to provide training and teaching in sermon preparation. Some topics will include researching the text, interpretation, and presentation.

405 - Mental Health Ministry I (formerly Life Direction Model I)

This course is designed to provide the student with knowledge of the essential tools required for spiritual direction. Some topics will include addictions, age development, and various types of communication barrier.

406 - Church History

(Prerequisite: New Testament Survey)

This course is designed to give the student an in-depth knowledge of the book of Acts and the history of the church. Some topics will include the development of the church, the scattered church, and the formation of denominations in the Protestant Church.

407 - Credential Essentials for the Minister

This course is designed to walk ministers through the licensure and consecration process including recommendation, application, documentation, examination. This course also provides the candidate with mentoring and accountability through the financial aspect of licensure such as credential fees, advertisement, vestments, and assessments.

408 - Metaphysics I

(Lessons In Truth) This course is designed to introduce another way of interpreting the scriptures. This course focuses on the scriptures as it relates to the spiritual meaning for the individual. Some topics will include healing, wholeness, and the twelve disciples on a metaphysical level.

409 - Grace, Spiritual & Ascension Gifts

This course will disclose and define God's grace particularly as it relates to the nine gifts of The Spirit in 1 Corinthians 12 and the 5-fold ministry gifts found in Ephesians 4:8-16 and how they function.

410 - Introduction to Doctrinal Statements

(Prerequisites: completed Ministers level or permission from academic counselor)

This course introduces the student to the Doctrinal Statements (also known as our Statement of Faith) of The Church of the Everlasting Kingdom. It will provide a summary of our understanding of key biblical doctrines, which are in harmony with new thought Christianity.

501 - Character Development

This course is designed to provide mature believers (deacons and upcoming elders) with a theoretical and practical understanding of characters and to empower students to manifest the character of Christ.

502 - Ministry and Works of a Deacon

(Practicum Required)

This course is designed to provide the students with an in-depth theoretical practical understanding of the history, qualifications, and work of the deacon in the church through research, discussion, and practice. Students will also continue to gain a basic understanding of Truth Principles as it relates to the 12 disciples (power, energy centers) and how they can be applied to our daily lives through mediation and implementation.

503 - Introduction to Church Doctrine

This course is designed to give the student a basic understanding of church doctrine and policy. Some topics will include ordination and sacraments.

504 - Introduction to Five-Fold Ministry Gifts

This class is designed to provide the student with a foundation in understanding his/her call to ministry and how it relates to ascension gifts of five-fold ministry gifts from a historical, theoretical, and practical perspective.

505 - Homiletics II

(Prerequisite Homiletics I)

This course is designed to provide students with a deeper theoretical and practical understanding of sermon preparation, presentation, and evaluation of what is offered in Sermon Preparation.

506 - Metaphysics II

(Prerequisite: Metaphysics I)

This course surveys the 12 Powers and is designed to provide the student with deeper insight into Metaphysics as it relates to "truth" principles through reading, reflection, discussion, and practice.

507 - The Ministry of the Adjutant

(Prerequisite: The Ministry of the Armor Bearer)

This course is designed to teach students how to serve bishops in general and ceremonial settings from a historical, theoretical, and practical perspective. Emphasis will be the vestments, the ministry of the acolyte and protocol.

508 - Church Administration II

(Prerequisite: Church Administration I)

This course is designed to teach students how to effectively serve spiritual leaders, overseers, and bishops in the spirit of excellence through administration.

509 - Mental Health Ministry II

(Prerequisite: Mental Health Ministry I)

This course is designed to provide the student with a more in-depth knowledge of the tools for spiritual direction.

510 - Credential Essentials for the Deacon

This course is designed to guide Deacons through the ordination and consecration process including recommendation, application, documentation, examination. This course also provides the candidate with mentoring and accountability through the financial aspect of ordination such as credential fees, advertisement, vestments, and assessments.

(Prerequisites: completed Deacon level or permission from academic counselor)

601 - Hermeneutics

This course is designed to provide students with an in-depth understanding of the principles and processes governing classical Hermeneutics of the Scriptures.

602 - Advanced Church Doctrine

(Prerequisite: Introduction To Church Doctrine)

This course is designed to provide students with an in-depth knowledge of the doctrines of this local church through research, theory, discussion, and practice with special emphasis on controversial topics.

603 - Homiletics III

This course is designed to provide students with an in-depth theoretical and practical understanding of sermon preparation, presentation, and evaluation.

604 - Advanced Five-Fold Ministry

(Prerequisite: Introduction To Five-Fold Ministry)

This course is designed to provide students with clarity about his or her call to eldership and five-fold ministry gifts from a historical, theoretical, and practical perspective.

605 - Ministry of Sacraments

(Practicum required)

This course is designed to empower and train deacons and elders to be effective spiritual leaders by thoroughly exploring the Holy Sacraments of the Church-marriages, baptisms, blessing of children, Holy Communion, ordinations, laying on of hands, and anointing with oil, and funerals.

606 - Metaphysics III

This course offers the student an alternative to the many traditionally accepted Christian doctrines. Metaphysics III, will challenge the student to examine their thinking behind traditional Christian beliefs, offer some nontraditional perspectives and allow one to decide what is valid for yourself. Teachings considered are God, Jesus Christ, heaven, hell, Satan, sin, worship, communion, prayer, baptism, and life after death. This course will expand your thinking and enhance your spiritual growth.

607- Credential Essentials for Elders

This course is designed to guide Elders through the ordination and consecration process including recommendation, application, documentation, examination. This course also provides the candidate with mentoring and accountability through the financial aspect of licensure such as credential fees, advertisement, vestments, and assessments.

608 - Advanced Character Development

This course is designed to provide clergy with a loving climate to work through any character issues that may stand in the way of their advancement in ministry, through case studies, role plays, and healing dialogues.

609 - The Ministry and Work of the Elder

The office of and elder is the highest ordination in the body of Christ. Elders are people who have been called to the five-fold ministry. This course provides instructions on the spiritual, domestic, and personal qualifications of an Elder according to the bible (1 Timothy 3:1-7 and Titus 1:5-9) the student will learn the work and ministry of an Elder, as preacher, teacher, healer, priest, and servant.

701 - Introduction to the Office of Spiritual Leader

Through theory and practice, this course will empower students to develop/review the name, vision, mission, colors, core values, doctrine, church scripture, church song, logo /seal, and organizational structure of their local assembly with purpose and intentionality.

702 - Timothy: An Example of a Spiritual Leader

Using Timothy as an example, the students will study the historic "problems" and solutions as well as the modern-day issues and resolutions of being Spiritual Leader of a local assembly.

703 - The Ministry and Work of the Spiritual Leader

This course is designed to provide students with an in-depth understanding of the roles, responsibilities, rights and rewards of being a Spiritual Leader of a local assembly, ministry and business.

704 - Ministry Plan

This course is designed to give the student practical application to develop and implement vision, mission, and purpose statements, to develop a 1, 3,5,10-year plan, and church growth strategies.

705 - Ministry and Life

This course is designed to give the student practical application in spiritual discipleship & training, tracking, and wholeness, balancing ministry, family, and marriage.

706 - Ministry and Business

This course is designed to give the student practical application in Team/organizational structures (Demographic, 5-fold, and team structure); finances (tithes &due, operational accounts, record keeping, equipment pricing, rent/lease options) Legal documents (Constitution, Bylaws, Tax Exemption).

707 - Ministry and Organization

This course is designed to give the student practical application in Public Relations, Publications and Announcements, Effective Community Outreach Programs, Effective Evangelism; Church Events, Service Schedules (Sunday, midweek), Church Administration, Church/Family Meetings.

708 - Ministry of the Apostle

This course is designed for elders who feel that their five-fold ministry gifting is that of an apostle. The course will give the student further insight into the ministry of the apostle in the 21st century church and the Kingdom of God from a historical, theological, and practical perspective.

709 - Ministry of the Prophet

This course is designed for elders who feel that their five-fold ministry gifting is that of a prophet. The course will give the student further insight into the ministry of the prophet in the 21st century church and the Kingdom of God from a historical, theological, and practical perspective.

710 - Ministry of the Evangelist

This course is designed for elders who feel that their five-fold ministry gifting is that of an evangelist. The course will give the student further insight into the ministry of the evangelist in the 21st century church and the Kingdom of God from a historical, theological, and practical perspective.

711 - Ministry of the Pastor

This course is designed for elders who feel that their five-fold ministry gifting is that of a pastor. The course will give the student further insight into the ministry of the pastor in the 21st century church and the Kingdom of God from a historical, theological, and practical perspective.

712 - Ministry of the Teacher

This course is designed for elders who feel that their five-fold ministry gifting is that of an teacher. The course will give the student further insight into the ministry of the teacher in the 21st century church and the Kingdom of God from a historical, theological, and practical perspective.

713 - The Spiritual Leader's Practicum

With a consciousness of spiritual, numerical, financial, and physical growth of their local assembly, students will explore their leadership style and benefits of pluralistic ministry. Students will also learn how to balance the left (bishops, overseers, elders, deacons, ministers, etc.) with the right (apostles, prophets, evangelists, pastors, and teachers) of ministry.

801 - Introduction to the Office of the Overseer

Through theory and practice, this course will empower students to develop/review the name, vision, mission, colors, core values, doctrine, church scripture, church song, logo /seal of their covering and the heart of the bishop(s) that they serve.

802 – Life of Joseph

Using Joseph as an example, the students will study the historic "problems" and solutions as well as the modern-day issues and resolutions of being an Overseer in a covering.

803 - The Ministry and Work of an Overseer

This course is designed to provide students with an in-depth understanding of the roles, responsibilities, rights, and rewards of being an Overseer in a covering. Special attention will also be given to the various types of overseers.

804 - The Overseer's Practicum

With a consciousness of spiritual, numerical, financial, and physical growth of the covering, students will explore their leadership style, being a team player as well as building a national team for ministry effectiveness, efficiency, and excellence.

901 - Introduction to the Office of the Bishop

The primary biblical texts that outline the office of the bishop are I Timothy 3:1-7 and Titus 1:6-9. In establishing the groundwork for the office of Bishop, Paul makes this opening observation, if a man(person) desires the office of the bishop, he (she) desires a good work. It is a good work because it requires preparation and diligence, along with exemplary character and integrity. This course introduces the candidate to the office of the bishop. The student will be required to reflect and write a thesis that chronicles their ministerial journey, aspirations, and readiness for this office.

902 - Catechism and Creeds

The Bible teaches that a Bishop must be able to teach 1Timothy 3:2 in preparation for the episcopacy it is imperative that he/she have an adequate knowledge of Ecclesiology. This course will provide the student with the understanding and importance of catechism, the apostle creed and Nicene creed and their significance to the Christian faith and the episcopacy.

903 - The Ministry and Work of the Bishop

Since the time of the New Testament and throughout the history of the Christian church, there has been the order of Bishop who carry the administration work of overseeing, leading, supervising, and uniting the church worldwide. Regardless of ranking, the bishop learns to operate in various and divergent roles. In this course the candidate will learn to recognize and describe the types of prelates. This course is designed to prepare student, through the study of church history, conducting interviews, and writing research papers on the various roles, responsibilities, and effectiveness as a bishop in the Lord's Church.

904 - The Bishops Practicum

1 Timothy 3:1 is clear "whoever aspires to the office of a bishop desires a noble task (work)." A Bishop is planted in a vineyard, he or she should produce works that will validate their ministry. This course will require an episcopal project to be completed. the assignment will be in alignment with the role and responsibility within the Organization, Reformation or Fellowship. The student will also be required to

identify and name the vestments and ornaments that pertain to the office of the bishop and their symbolic meaning.

ELECTIVES

E001 Teacher Preparation 2-hour sessions for 3 weeks

This course is designed to prepare instructors of MOC to adequately prepare to instruct MOC courses.

E002 Credential Essentials 2-hour session

This course is designed to provide the student practical application to formalize the process to confer licensure and ordination. The student will be able to determine the criteria for credentials, policies, and procedures for those who are and are not under the C.O.T.E.K. covering.

E003 Principles of Financial Freedom 2-hour sessions for 8 weeks

This is an extensive eight (8) week course, which uses money as a tool to deeper faith in God as our source. Each class session features an inner process designed to produce deep healing of core issues.
